

The Priests of the Sacred (S.C.J.), also known as Dehonians after the last name of our founder Leo John Dehon, serve in 41 countries throughout the world. We began o serve the Native Americans in the Lower Brule area in 1923, and soon afterwards began to minister those on the Cheyenne Indian Reservation. Years later, the Priests of the Sacred Heart began to also serve the Farmers and Ranchers in the region. Today, we serve six parishes in the East and West Missouri river regions. They are:

> St. Mary's in Lower Brule, St. Mary's in Reliance, St. Michael's in Kennebec, St. Joseph's in Fort Thompson, Immaculate Conception in Stephan and St. Catherine's in Big Bend.

Our other missions include St. Joseph's Native American school founded in 1927 and the Sacred Heart

center on the Cheyenne River Indian Reservation. The school is dedicated to improving the quality of life for Lakota and Dakota (Sioux) children and families. The Sacred Heart Center covers over 4,707 square miles and operates four primary programs; Family Violence Services, Child Services, Community Outreach and Bear Necessities

Our ministries are also supported by the Benedictine Sisters of Watertown, SD. The sisters first came to the United States in 1864 in Missouri and then settled in the Dakota Territory in 1874 in Zell, SD. In 1889, they built their Sacred Heart Monastery in Yankton SD and then broke grown for their Mother of God Community in 1967 in Watertown, SD. The Benedictine sisters established schools, Hospitals and other services around the Dakotas,



Scripture Reflection

OUR PARISH BULLETIN

What is chaos? There are a couple of definitions. One is a state of utter confusion and the other is the unpredictability of the way nature behaves, such as with wind, hail or snowstorms or how the body gets sick very quickly. I would guess that most of us have experienced these things and others as well. We are living in chaotic times in history. We have COVID 19 and the global pandemic, we have wars, we have rioting and murder of innocent people. We have seen various forms of violence our cities. Chaos appears to have the upper hand and will not leave soon.

Todays reading remind us of who is in charge over chaos. Who has conquered and tamed chaos over nature like the raging seas and in the storms of our personal lives? But God does not conquer with force. God defeats by the mere gentle command of his words. One might say that he overthrows chaos or evil by the whisper of his words.

If we begin with the Book of Genesis, we see how God conquered Chaos. Or more specifically, how God brought about a peaceful newly created world through the command of his words. A peace that our early parents, Adam and Eve, both felt and experienced until they disobeyed God and allowed chaos back into human life.

In the ancient world, the seas were thought of as chaos. Many fishermen feared storms. They tried to stay close to the shoreline. If you have ever had been stuck in a severe and dangerous storm that came out of no where, you know the fear that you had from that experience. I've seen grow men cry like a baby because they were unprepared on how to cope with the situation.

In the first reading for Kings, we read that Elijah went to Mount Horeb, another word for Mount Sinai (the Holy place where God dwelled) to be apparently be alone. There, God asks him to come out of the dark cave to see the Lord pass by. Once outside, Elijah seems to believe that God is like some fierce chaotic part of nature like heavy gale storm level wind, or an earthquake or fire. No, what Elijah experienced was that the strength of God and God's presence was in a tiny whisper.

In the Gospel, we hear that Jesus, having feed thousands of people and having heard about the death of his cousin John the Baptist, he goes off to a quite place to pray and rest and be alone. In the meantime, the disciples are in a panic in their boat in the middle of a chaotic storm. We all know what happens next. Jesus walks on water (conquering nature like God), the disciples believe he is a ghost, in their fear and anxiety Jesus tells them Take courage, it is I, do not be afraid, Peter asks to come to Jesus and while doing so becomes fearful that he may drown and cries out for Jesus' help, who naturally saves him. And we hear that great line from Jesus, "O you of little faith."

So, what message can you and I take from these readings. Well, we should no that God is always in the middle of the chaos of our lives to comfort us. To whisper to us do not be afraid. For Jesus suffered and died for us to remind us that he did all of this so we would not have fears. That he continues to walk towards us on the chaotic waters in our lives. That he has conquered death and the things in our lives that we have no control over.

Christ knows the chaos in our lives. He is there to calm the turmoil that we experience in those moments that a loved one dies, or a child is very sick or a physical or emotional tragedy that we experience. And, he is there when we knowingly sin against him. Similarly, we also are affected by the sins of other, such as hate, racism, addictions, bad relationship, etc. Despite all of this, Jesus still walks across the waters of our sinfulness and our sorrow to pull us out of the water of fear and despair.

Let us always walk in faith towards our Lord no matter what chaos we are experiencing. Be not afraid. Come out of the cave of fear, come out of the boat of despair and hear the words of Jesus say: take courage, it is I, do not be afraid. (MM)
