The Priests of the Sacred (S.C.J.), also known as Dehonians after the last name of our founder Leo John Dehon, serve in 41 countries throughout the world. We began to serve the Native Americans in the Lower Brule area in 1923, and soon afterwards began to minister those on the Cheyenne Indian Reservation. Years later, the Priests of the Sacred Heart began to also serve the Farmers and Ranchers in the region. Today, we serve six parishes in the East and West Missouri river regions. They are:

St. Mary's in Lower Brule, St. Mary's in Reliance, St. Michael's in Kennebec, St. Joseph's in Fort Thompson, Immaculate Conception in Stephan and St. Catherine's in Big Bend.

Our other missions include St. Joseph's Native American school founded in 1927 and the Sacred Heart

Center on the Cheyenne River Indian Reservation. The school is dedicated to improving the quality of life for Lakota and Dakota (Sioux) children and families. The Sacred Heart Center covers over 4,707 square miles and operates four primary programs; Family Violence Services, Child Services, Community Outreach and Bear Necessities Thrift Store.

Our ministries are also supported by the Benedictine Sisters of Watertown, SD. The sisters first came to the United States in 1864 in Missouri and then settled in the Dakota Territory in 1874 in Zell, SD. In 1889, they built their Sacred Heart Monastery in Yankton SD and then broke grown for their Mother of God Community in 1967 in Watertown, SD. The Benedictine sisters established schools, Hospitals and other services around the Dakotas,





# **Scripture Reflection**

On the western side of the cathedral of Notre Dame in Paris is a scene of Christ judging those who have died, and we can see St. Michael is weighing the souls. It can be seen a scary picture depicting how some people are going to heaven and others are going to hell.

Today's Gospel portrays Christ as a kingly man presiding over the scene of final judgment where men and women will be separated like a shepherd separating sheep from the goats---the good and the bad. It is frightening to think about what we will be—sheep or goats? Most of us do not want to think about judgement day. We want to avoid thinking about how and where we will be judged by God. However, in today's Gospel, Jesus wants us to face this thought in order for us to take risks to secure our spot in heaven.

One of he reasons that we do not think about how we will be judged is because we usually read about God being the good Shepherd. God's loving, kind and merciful. However, Jesus is telling us today that it is our behavior and our lack of charitable action that may turn us away from God causing us to spend our eternal life elsewhere other than heaven.

As someone once said, we will not be judged by our belief or intellectual beliefs or political beliefs. The world judges us by our achievement and intellectual ideas and political orientations. No, we will be judged by our love concretely expressed in helping others. It is not being disposed of loving our neighbor in the intellectual mind but by how you and I actually help a person in a close and caring way. This is why we hear Jesus say today: "Amen I say to you that whatever you did for the brother of mine, you did it for me-"-- that is to mean we perform acts of mercy like giving one drink, feeding the hungry, clothing the naked, visiting one in prison, etc. And then Jesus says when one does not perform such charitable actions, one will be accursed into the eternal fire. These words do not sound like the words of a nice Shepherd.

This Feast Day of Christ the King is to remind us of the fact and reality that we all belong to the same earthly Kingdom and that God is to rule over our lives, internally and externally. That the Kingdom of Christ is ruled by compassion and love to all, especially toward the poor. That Kingdom begins on earth and we call it the Church. The church is not just an institution, but the body of Christ—a spiritual organism. What affect others affects Christ. This is why we hear Jesus saying that "as you did it one of the least of these my brethren, you did it to me." (Mt 25:40). We here the same in the Acts of the Apostles when Saul, soon to be named Paul, was struck down to the ground and heard the voice of Jesus say," Saul, Saul, why are you persecuting me." Even though Jesus is in his glorified body, and we are connected to it, Jesus in some mystical way is affected negatively by our sins. On the other hand, Jesus is positively affected when a sinner repents and performs acts of charity. In essence, we are to seek out and to meet Christ wherever he may be found, in a particular way in human life in all its stages and conditions.

So, you and I touch Christ when we serve others. When we fail to serve others, we fail to serve Christ. We are obligated to care for the least of our brothers and sisters, especially those in great need. We are out of step and out of relationship with God if we do not listen to this message. A message that is to transform our lives. We are not to put the message in a locked vault or safe hoping that the safe door will magically open and remind us that we need to help others.

Our Catholic theology speaks about two judgements: the particular and the general. We know that each one of us will face our own particular or personal judgement at the point of our death. Then there is the general judgement which is what our Gospel reading is all about. This occurs on the Last Day and it will be Christ who exercises this judgement. At that time, there is no opportunity for those to be judged to offer justification or defense of their actions; there is no possibility of a trial, no jurors, just a verdict.

Our liturgical has come to and end and a new one begins next week with Advent. Make use of the Sacrament of Reconciliation whenever we find ourselves having committed serious sin so that we might be restored to union with Christ. The Advent season it is a good time to return to this wonderful sacrament. This will help keep us properly separated from the goats. (Fr. Mark Mastin, SCJ)
