

The Priests of the Sacred (S.C.J.), also known as Dehonians after the last name of our founder Leo John Dehon, serve in 41 countries throughout the world. We began o serve the Native Americans in the Lower Brule area in 1923, and soon afterwards began to minister those on the Cheyenne Indian Reservation. Years later, the Priests of the Sacred Heart began to also serve the Farmers and Ranchers in the region. Today, we serve six parishes in the East and West Missouri river regions. They are:

> St. Mary's in Lower Brule, St. Mary's in Reliance, St. Michael's in Kennebec, St. Joseph's in Fort Thompson, Immaculate Conception in Stephan and St. Catherine's in Big Bend.

Our other missions include St. Joseph's Native American school founded in 1927 and the Sacred Heart

center on the Cheyenne River Indian Reservation. The school is dedicated to improving the quality of life for Lakota and Dakota (Sioux) children and families. The Sacred Heart Center covers over 4,707 square miles and operates four primary programs; Family Violence Services, Child Services, Community Outreach and Bear Necessities

Our ministries are also supported by the Benedictine Sisters of Watertown, SD. The sisters first came to the United States in 1864 in Missouri and then settled in the Dakota Territory in 1874 in Zell, SD. In 1889, they built their Sacred Heart Monastery in Yankton SD and then broke grown for their Mother of God Community in 1967 in Watertown, SD. The Benedictine sisters established schools, Hospitals and other services around the Dakotas,



Scripture Reflection

What are you and I worth both in a monetary sense, talent, or a value sense? What would be our salary? Are you and I worth the investment for someone to hire us? Will the quality of our work output match our value? Perhaps it is not what we do that gives us worth or value or talent but rather who we are and what we do with the talent we have been given.

In today's first reading, this woman is beautifully described as a worthy wife whose value is beyond pearls. The quality of her work output far exceeds her value. Her value begins with God for she is one that fears the Lord and is to be rewarded for her labors and who will be praised for it. What she does comes from who she is---a person who is devoted to God which in turn allows her to love everyone she meets. She is authentic.

How we are seen on the outside comes from within---for good or for bad. Even if we try to hide our inner self, the real inner self eventually comes to the surface.

Today's Gospel continues to ask the question about our individual value and worth or talent and how each of man is to guard and or use those talents given to them. In the time of Jesus, a talent was a unit of weight. In essence, God is looking to invest in three men and expects them in return to live up to investing as well. What God is expecting is to see how their inner behavior or inner drive will shine forth. God has made each of these men, and us, as special individuals with our own unique gifts and talents and not all are equal. That is why one man is given five talents (coins), another two talents and to another one talent.

So, as the parable goes, the first two servants double their talents. IN terms of spiritual talents, these two servants gladly went about their business, producing an abundance of works of love and mercy—this is what "talents" mean in connection with the servants' productivity---just like the woman of the first reading.

However, the other servant, because he feared his master's wrath for not making any money, he buries the one talent. Not a good move for this man with one talent. An improper response is also, ironically, a kind of fear. Unfortunately, his fear is rooted in a false image of his master, whom he regards as harsh and demanding. In fact, while the master acknowledges that he is severe, but the master still does not accept the third servant's description of him as "demanding." What does this tell us? Well, in part, it tells us that the third servant had a false image of God as someone who is harsh if we do not life up to God's expectations. Ow many times have we felt tis way and bury ourselves into the material world of unhappiness. Unfortunately, the Master is furious buried the talent and that the third servant did not make an effort to at least invest his talent---regardless if the investment failed. This man was thrown into the darkness where there will be wailing and grinding of teeth.

Wow. This sounds like a cruel and unforgiving Master. Is this parable represent who God is? Will God throw us out into the darkness if we fail to live up to the talents, he has given us? What is Jesus telling us? First, like the women in our firsts reading who had a beautiful interior that drove her to use her talents and gifts to the fullest. We have to allow Christ to invest himself into our lives. To allow him into our interior life. When we keep Christ in our lives, we in turn keep the talents and those talents tend to grow, just like the first two men's investments grew.

When the psalm says blessed are those who fear the Lord, it means to have awe and respect for God. We are entrusted to the talents we have today. For today will take care of itself if we trust in Christ. God is to be seen as generous and excited for us when we do his will. When we reach out to others to show them love, kindness and forgiveness. As in the parable, God gives each of us the freedom to use our talents as best we can. Our goal in life and at the end of life is to hear the Lord say to us, Well done my good and faithful servant, come, share in your master's joy. (Fr. Mark Mastin, SCJ)
