The Priests of the Sacred (S.C.J.), also known as Dehonians after the last name of our founder Leo John Dehon, serve in 41 countries throughout the world. We began to serve the Native Americans in the Lower Brule area in 1923, and soon afterwards began to minister those on the Cheyenne Indian Reservation. Years later, the Priests of the Sacred Heart began to also serve the Farmers and Ranchers in the region. Today, we serve six parishes in the East and West Missouri river regions. They are:

St. Mary's in Lower Brule, St. Mary's in Reliance, St. Michael's in Kennebec, St. Joseph's in Fort Thompson, Immaculate Conception in Stephan and St. Catherine's in Big Bend.

Our other missions include St. Joseph's Native American school founded in 1927 and the Sacred Heart

Center on the Cheyenne River Indian Reservation. The school is dedicated to improving the quality of life for Lakota and Dakota (Sioux) children and families. The Sacred Heart Center covers over 4,707 square miles and operates four primary programs; Family Violence Services, Child Services, Community Outreach and Bear Necessities Thrift Store

Our ministries are also supported by the Benedictine Sisters of Watertown, SD. The sisters first came to the United States in 1864 in Missouri and then settled in the Dakota Territory in 1874 in Zell, SD. In 1889, they built their Sacred Heart Monastery in Yankton SD and then broke grown for their Mother of God Community in 1967 in Watertown, SD. The Benedictine sisters established schools, Hospitals and other services around the Dakotas,



Scripture Reflection

As we come to the end of our Liturgical year in four weeks and the end of our calendar in December, it is time to take stock in how our spiritual lives improved or perhaps need improvement for the coming year. We all like to observe time. We mark down birthdays, anniversaries of weddings and loss of a loved one. However, we tend not to mark down how have we awakened our heart and minds to God and treating our neighbors kindly and mercifully during this past year. Have we used the gift of time that God has given us to live our daily lives in such a way that we are prepared to meet God when we are to die?

The Greek Poet Horace, who lived 40 years before Christ, coined the phrase, *carpe diem, quam minimum credula postero*, which is often translated as "Seize or pluck the day, put very little trust in tomorrow (the future)". This Latin phrase that comes from one of his poems, tell us that the future is unknown, and we cannot see it. From this insight, we get the modern phrase, eat, drink and be merry.

Nearly at the same time period, we here of another the ancient Greek writer, Seneca, write: "It is not that we have so little time, but that we have wasted so much of it." So true for today. How much time do we waste on social media, playing video games or watching TV? St. Paul who wrote to Greek Christians, centuries later in Ephesus says: "Look carefully then how you walk, not as unwise men (and women) but as wise making the most of the time." (Ephesians 5: 15ff).

Our readings today give us a sense of how we should use our time wisely. For we should not leave to chance our future happenings, but rather one should do all one can today to make one's own present and future better. For those of us who are on our earthly journey to Jesus, seizing the day means to awaken our hearts. To live today for the Lord because we do not know the time that we must leave this earth. Our Catholic liturgical year follows a recurring cycle and theme. It directs us toward beginnings and ends and, in doing so, emphasizes an important truth that can only be grasped through faith. For every end is a beginning.

The Gospel today is reminding us then that staying awake does not literally mean not getting sleep. It is a metaphor for us to awaken our entire being to Jesus in our lives. Christ invites us to begin anew. He invites us to is earthly banquet at the Eucharist and is inviting to be ready to accept his invitation to the heavenly banquet. To see the spiritual sunrise of him everyday. This Gospel is also giving us a sense or taste of anticipated joy at joining Jesus in the heavenly wedding banquet which is the image of eternal life. The wedding banquet highlights eternal life as that state in which the deepest hunger and thirst in our lives will be satisfied, especially the hunger and thirst for love, for God who is love. Our psalm to-day reflects this feeling when it says: "My soul is thirsting for you, O Lord my God."

The Jewish tradition and belief in an afterlife varied. Some believed that people went to Sheol where people could neither know God nor praise him. Others thought that one just dies, and the afterlife is only how people remember you. The Pharisees did believe in the afterlife and the Sadducees did not. Regardless of ones' Jewish afterlife belief, a Jew tried to live each day to the fullest—the eat, drink and be merry philosophy. However, God wants us to believe that there is life after death. Instead of eating, drinking and being merry in a careless and unholy way each day, we are to eat his flesh and drink his blood at the Eucharist where our merriment and happiness truly exists. To seize the day by growing deeper in our relationship with Christ.

We do need seize the day by living in the present moment. By doing so, it allows us to pause and to be aware of how God is moving in our life and observing others in our life. This attitude, in part, is what Jesus meant by staying awake. It is what Paul meant as well when he says today, thus, we shall always be with the Lord. Therefore, console one another with these words" --- which describe the hope in the resurrection and life with Christ when we die. For Jesus wants us to be like the wise virgins who had sufficient holy oil in their spiritual lamps that were lit and ready to see the face of God in the Kingdom of the heavenly banquet. (Fr.
